- April 7: Pastor Patrick steps into the pulpit to share a good post-Easter word with us.
- April 14: In Luke 24:35b-48 two disciples encounter the resurrected Christ... but almost fail to recognize him. We'll use this story to explore ways to "see" Christ in our daily lives.
- April 21: In celebration of Earth Day we will have a "blessing of the recycling bins"! Don't bring your recycling bin to church... but do come for worship where we'll reflect on our call to care for God's good creation. Everyone who attends will receive a sticker to place on your recycling bin as a reminder. We'll end worship by gathering outside with our neighbors at First Presbyterian and Trinity Episcopal churches for an Earth Day doxology.
- April 28: It's a pulpit swap! Come and welcome Rev. James Boyce, pastor at Hopkins Chapel African Methodist Episcopal Zion Church. He will be preaching at our 8:45 and 10:55 services. Meanwhile, Pastor Mary will preach at Hopkins Chapel at their 11am service.
- May 5: The children will be presenting a musical after the 10:55 service: "Daniel's Dangerous Dilemma." In preparation both our worship services will explore the Scripture behind that dilemma, Daniel 6:16-23.
- May 12: Happy Mother's Day! Come worship with us on this "Ascension Sunday," a day to remember and explore the meaning of Christ's ascension in Acts 1:1-11.





Equal Plates Project: Celebrating Volunteers and One Year in CUMC's Kitchen

Since transforming Central's kitchen into a commercial kitchen in March of 2023, Equal Plates Project has prepared and distributed over 30,000 scratch-made meals into the community, over 28,000 of which fed those facing food insecurity. "We could not be more grateful for our partnership with CUMC - the Church has again and again demonstrated the depth of their commitment to share space for the betterment of our whole community," says Madi Holtzman, Executive Director of Equal Plates. "Plus, being right downtown makes it super easy for our farm partners to deliver their incredible ingredients."

Equal Plates Project is unique in their approach to food justice. Not only are they preparing delicious scratch-made meals for those facing barriers to food access, they are also strengthening WNC's local economy and food system by purchasing products from small, local farmers at market value. Since opening the kitchen at CUMC, Equal Plates Project has invested over \$55,000 into small, local farms.

Equal Plates Project prepares meals for a variety of community partners. Monday through Friday, they provide lunch for the 85 residents living at Homeward Bound's Compass Point Villages. Equal Plates Project also supports Counterpoint's Safe Shelter and the Salvation Army's Code Purple Shelter with weekly meals.

Equal Plates Project aspires to build community through food. It feels especially impactful when a meal can be shared with other community members as done at United Way's Community Nights, Circle of Security Parenting groups, and right here at Central United Methodist Church after Sunday services.

Equal Plates is also the leading provider of prepared meals delivered to Buncombe County Medicaid clients through the state supported Healthy Opportunities Project (www.wnc-hop.org).

This deeply impactful work couldn't be done without the support of their volunteers and donors. Equal Plates Project would love to have your positive energy and support to help expand and deepen their impact in our community! Attendees Filled the Fellowship Hall

Interest was high March 17, to hear Luke Lingle, Central's Executive Pastor, present largescreen photographs and stories of his recent trip to Central's partner congregation, Moheto First United Methodist Church in Kenya. The congregations' cross-cultural relationship has blossomed since its 2020 COVID-19 pandemic start via internet Zoom meetings with the Reconciling Ministry Group. Since then, Moheto's pastor Rev. Kennedy Mwita has twice visited the Central congregation. Rev. Lingle's weeklong trip was the first in-person visit to Moheto on behalf of Central.

The presentation highlighted the great ministries of his hosts, Rev. Mwita and wife, Elnora, a lay pastor serving nearby United Methodist congregations. They gave generous hospitality and, he noted, that extends to their congregations and larger community. Pastor Luke was especially impressed by the poor economic conditions of rural western Kenya. It severely impacts family livelihood and


limits children's educational progress toward daily food security and employment. This Moheto church, the first Reconciling Ministry Congregation in Africa, has grown quickly. Its worship is vibrant in joyful singing, dancing, preaching, and ministry to serve many needs. Pastor Luke preached and taught lay leaders throughout the district to learn more about the United Methodist Church in .

Climaxing Pastor Luke's presentation, it was announced that Central's commitment to Moheto, supported by the Reconciling Ministry Group, Missions Council and Trustees, approved Central's Foundation Fund giving \$25,000 to open the educational opportunity for more Moheto children. With leadership by Pastor Mwita and Central, other U.S. United Methodist congregations will be invited to help sustain children's chance for a life changing high school education. Responding to the news, attendees strongly affirmed this action.

Central's Invitation to International Guests

Long awaited, the General Conference of the United Methodist Church will receive thousands of worldwide elected delegates and visitors meeting at the Charlotte Convention Center April 23-May 3. Some CUMC staff and members will be visiting. It's open and free to visitors.

Central has extended an invitation for Moheto's Pastor Kennedy Mwita to return and accompany the Ethiopia-Kenya Conference Bishop, Daniel Wandabula of Uganda, to visit Asheville for worship and meet Central's congregants on Sunday, April 28. This is an important opportunity to meet African United Methodist guests!







Meet CUMC's Students In Kenya

Here in Asheville, it's easy to take our children's education for granted. We have good schools and the cost of public education is paid through our taxes.

It's different in Kenya. In Kenya, elementary schools are funded through the national government. So are universities.

The government doesn't pay for high school. In Kenya, students' families pay the cost of their children's high school education. This means that most children – especially girls – don't go to high school.

CUMC has been working with First United Methodist Church Moheto in Moheto, Kenya, to see that at least some girls go to high school. This year, 2024, we are sponsoring 10 girls.

Over the next few issues of the Jot and Tittle, we'll introduce you to the students we sponsor.




accepted by other recycling groups, so their work helps to keep pollution out of our environment.



ECO-Tip:

Green Paper: In general, try to buy products/containers made from recycled material as often as possible to support the recycled product market. When purchasing paper products (printer paper, toilet paper, etc.), look for unbleached paper that has been recycled using a minimum of 50% post-consumer waste.

The EPA estimates that a typical person generates 4.3 pounds of waste a day. The amount of time that waste products take to fully decompose is a significant environmental concern. Landfill gas



- The average American throws away an estimated 185 pounds of plastic annually. Plastic bag decomposition takes 10-20 years. A plastic bottle takes 450 years to fully decompose.
- Paper waste, based on volume, is the largest element of American landfills. Paper products take 2-6 weeks to fully decompose.
- Common grocery store fruit decomposition times—a banana peel takes 3-4 weeks, an orange takes 6 months.



On Wednesday, May 8, from 5:30 pm - 7:30 pm in the Fellowship Hall there will be a presentation by Noel Nickle from the North Carolina Coalition for Alternatives to the Death Penalty (NCCADP). The NCCADP is a statewide coalition of member organizations and individuals committed to ending the death penalty and creating a new vision of justice. Noel will introduce "Racist Roots," a powerful 25-minute film produced by the Center for Death Penalty Litigation. This film reveals the North Carolina death penalty's deep entanglement with slavery, lynching, and racism. Noel will be joined by Jean Parks, a murder victim's sister. For almost two decades, Jean has participated in efforts to release North Carolina from the burden of having a death penalty system. She spreads the word that she and many other murder victim family members believe the execution of a human being cannot bring justice or healing.

Following the film there will be a panel discussion and Q&A. The event will also include a call to action to write a postcard to Gov. Cooper calling on him to commute all NC death sentences. This is a free event and all are welcome!


Try this chilly new take on a healthy snack.
