This fall we're working our way through the Old Testament. Every Sunday from September 8 to November 24 we'll listen to a key passage between Genesis and Malachi. Our hope is that this will give you an overview that makes the Old Testament easier to understand.

Because God designed us to be better together, it only makes



sense that reading Scripture gets better when we help one another. We can experience that help in real time through group study – like the "Old Testament 101" class that's meeting on Wednesday nights. But we can also read Scripture "together" even when we read alone by drawing on

the wisdom of Christian tradition.

If you're trying to read the Bible more this fall (and I hope you are!) let these people of faith help you:

**Ellen Davis' 4-step pattern.** Last month I shared the repeating pattern I learned from this lovely Old Testament professor: (1) God creates; (2) Humans cause a rupture; (3) Divine judgment and suffering ensue; (4) God takes a new initiative toward humans. (Cont. on pg. 2)

#### Working Through the Old Testament (Cont. from pg. 1)

There is a lot of "divine judgment" in the Old Testament, but don't let that overshadow how many "new initiatives" God is willing to take.

#### The Wesleyan quadrilateral.

The founder of our Methodist movement, John Wesley, always started with Scripture, but he didn't read Scripture in a vacuum. Wesley drew on the tradition of the church, his own reasoning abilities, and his personal experience of God to make decisions of faith. As you read Scripture, be sure to bring those other three components into the conversation.

#### Adam Hamilton's "colander."

Jesus identified two greatest commandments: to love God and love neighbor (Matthew 22:34-40). The founding pastor of the Church of the Resurrection recommends using these as a "colander" when reading Scripture. When we encounter something like slavery in the Old Testament, we can run it through that colander to see if it "sticks."

Reading the Bible can be challenging, but that doesn't mean we shouldn't do it. It just means we shouldn't read the Bible alone! We read the Bible together – sometimes literally, sometimes figuratively, and always with the Holy Spirit to guide us.

#### **Central Handbell Choir**



"Where your treasure is, there your heart will be also" (Matthew 6:21).

We know the truth of these words! Our priorities are revealed by our spending habits. For that reason, a regular practice of giving to God is a key to keeping God our top priority.

This October we want to help you reflect on your own practice of giving. Each week we'll have "Ministry Moments" from members of our congregation and videos that highlight ministries funded by your giving. You'll receive a pledge card designed to help you prayerfully reflect on your personal giving practice; this will go out in the middle of the month by mail, email, and be available during worship. Driving around the I-240 loop at the beginning of September, I noticed that the leaves on the trees weren't as green as the month before. Fall is coming! And as summer fades away, the youth return from vacation, traveling, sleepovers, mission trips, and Wilderness Trail. They return to school, homework, college prep, and drama in their social circles. Back in Asheville for the fall and winter, they also return to youth group.

Youth group this year literally kicked off with a ball punted through the air and running the bases in the field behind Central Haw Creek.

The youth pulled up in the parking lot with some trepidation on their faces.

"Pastor Caroline, why are we here?"

"Trust me. I have an idea. It's going to be great."

As the rest of the stragglers and late arrivals meandered into our circle, we passed the hacky sack back and forth learning each other's names and where everyone went to school. We had several of our shy sixth graders join us for the first time while the high school upper-class students confidently flung their arms around one another's shoulders in greeting. As we walked out to the kickball field, I could feel the bashfulness threatening to creep into our conversations. However, as the ball bounced through the dirt and the teenagers started cheering for each other as they rounded the bases, what walls they had put up started to come down. One team may have scored more points but as we returned to the downstairs gathering space of Central Haw Creek, everyone felt like a winner.

In the second hour of youth group, we worked on decorating an inspirational poster and placemats for our friends in the Kairos Prison Ministry. Our discussion centered around consequences and reconciliation. God's grace is for everyone, and nothing can separate us from the love of God – not even a prison sentence. We decorated a poster that highlights our togetherness in Christ. In Christ, there is no longer slave or free; there is no longer male and female, for all of us are one in Christ Jesus (Galatians 3:23-29).

As we closed our time together on our first Sunday of the year, it felt so good to be back together again after a summer of separation. We had our big special events in June, July, and August, but we're ready to settle into the coziness of fall and the weekly meetings at Central Haw Creek.

First Book: The Color of Water: A Black Man's Tribute to His White Mother by James McBride






The Building Committee has been diligently working on the church renovation plan throughout the summer. Working with our architects, Clark Nexsen, there have been Visioning meetings with groups like the Montessori School, Equal Plates, Music Program, Youth and Young Adult, Worship groups and others to get feedback on what things should be considered in the church renovation plan. There has also been a lot of work on the Pocket Park planning and design, as well as work being done on a Building Assessment of the church. These meetings, the Building assessment, and other activities will provide input into the development of a Master Plan for what can be done at the church, how much it will cost and what types of phasing may be needed for this project.

Also, the Building Committee selected the organization, Partners for Sacred Places, to do a Capital Campaign Feasibility Study so that we can synchronize the results of the Master Plan and phasing with our fundraising feasibility. Partners for Sacred Places has had a strong working relationship with Central, has done several Halo studies about our economic impact, has much experience working with religious institutions including several churches in Asheville, and was reasonable in the cost they proposed for the Feasibility Study.

The work on the Building renovation and the Capital Campaign Feasibility Study will continue this fall so that we can synchronize these two efforts as we build a sound plan for CUMC's renovation. We will have some updates from the pulpit, Zoom calls, and other means of communication to keep you informed of our progress.

We welcome your input on these topics and you will be hearing more about our efforts in the coming weeks and months.


